1803

Valentine Wilhelm (William) Knabe is born in Kreuzburg, Germany. 1833

The company is left in the capable hands of sons William and Ernest upon the passing of William Knabe.

Knabe becomes the official piano of the one-year old Metropolitan Opera House, and is selected for the new, historic Paramount Theatre in New York.



Knabe's rich history began more than 200 years ago when Wilhelm (William) Knabe was born in Kreuzburg, Germany. Knabe learned the art of cabinet and piano making through apprenticeships, dedication and hard work. After immigrating to the United States, Knabe began work under Henry Hartye, a well-known piano maker, followed by establishing his own business of buying, selling, and repairing pianos from inside his home. He later partnered with Henry Gaehle to form the piano company Knabe & Gaehle, the genesis of Knabe's storied history.


Knabe & Gaehle built high-quality grands, uprights, and squares at a small factory in Baltimore at the rate of five per week. Although a modest output by today's standards, Knabe pianos still managed to compete with other well-established American manufacturers. After the admission

of Edward Betts as a partner in 1852, Knabe & Gaehle reorganized as Knabe, Gaehle & Co., but the partnership dissolved in 1855. As a result, Knabe founded his own firm, Wm. Knabe & Co., establishing itself as the finest piano maker in the market. Despite the hardships that accompanied the split, including fires that destroyed both of his piano factories, Knabe went on to win the Maryland Institute Exhibition over 20 other manufacturers. In 1860 Knabe built a large factory in Baltimore, occupying two city blocks and employing over 300 workers. With the outbreak of the Civil War and the resulting decline of the southern market, the company managed to keep afloat by expanding its markets into the growing American west.

The Knabe name is legendary, and it began in the town of Kreuzburg, Germany on June 3, 1803 with the birth of Wilhelm. As a child he wanted to follow the path of his father by becoming an apothecary (similar to a pharmacist), but the French invasion of Germany prevented him from doing so. Instead, he learned the art of cabinet and piano making through apprenticeships, traveling throughout Germany for several years while



mastering the trade. Through hard work and dedication, Knabe acquired a reputation for being an outstanding piano maker.

In 1831, Knabe met Christina Ritz, which resulted in an engagement of marriage. William accompanied his fiance's family as they immigrated to the United States, with the intention of becoming a farmer. During their voyage, Ritz' father became ill and died; so Knabe and his bride-to-be remained in Baltimore and familiarized themselves with the language and customs of the United States. Knabe found work under the well-known piano maker Henry Hartge and eventually abandoned his plans of becoming a farmer and moving to Hermann, Missouri, where Ritz's brother resided. After several years of diligent labor and saving money, he established his own business of purchasing, repairing and selling used pianos from his home. In 1839, Knabe partnered with Henry Gaehle to form the piano company Knabe & Gaehle, the genesis of Knabe's storied history.

William Knabe always pursued the piano making trade with pride, energy and dedication. Throughout his life, he always maintained strong character and a kindly disposition, qualities that were very respected by those who he touched. He was known as a generous man who believed in taking care of his employees, and instituted the tradition of an annual holiday and picnic to all workers and their families. He was also well-respected by his peers, and upon his death in 1864 was honored by businessmen for his integrity, skill and ingenuity.

William Knabe

The man behind the name

William Knabe passed away in 1864 but left the company in good hands with his sons Ernest and William, Jr. taking over. Knabe pianos continued to gain recognition for their superior sound quality and beauty of cabinetry, and to support the growing demand built modern factories and opened salesrooms in New York City and Washington. The company manufactured roughly 1,000 pianos per year. By the turn of the century, Knabe grew to be one of the most respected pianos, very popular among consumers and professionals alike.

From the very beginning, William Knabe committed himself and his company to building fine, high performance instruments. Through the years, Wm. Knabe has been a part of such establishments as the American Piano Company, Aeolian Corporation, and Mason Hamlin. Today, Knabe is the premium piano for Samick Music Corporation (SMC), one of the world's largest musical instrument manufacturers. SMC is proud to continue the manufacturing and production of these fine works of art, known throughout the world for their beauty of sound and cabinetry.

Many of the early upright and grand piano designs, originally created by Wm. Knabe and seemingly lost to antiquity, have been recovered by SMC, while many of those wonderful early design concepts have been incorporated into the Knabe pianos of today.

Francis Scott Key A Star-Spangled Knabe

On September 14, 1814, during the War of 1812, a lawyer-poet was detained on board a British boat just prior to the attack on Fort McHenry. This man was Francis Scott Key, and he had gone there to gain the release of his friend, William Beanes, who had been taken prisoner. Key was captured and detained on board overnight. All night long the two men paced the deck trying to catch a glimpse of the American flag waving over the fort. By dawn's early light, it was still there. So moved was Key by this victory that he

took an envelope from his pocket and wrote the words to the now famous song "The Star-Spangled Banner." Soon everyone in the land was singing the words to the tune of "To Anacreon in Heaven," an old English marching song.

In 1838, Francis Scott Key commissioned Knabe & Gaehle to custom-build a square grand piano for his home. This lavish, hand-carved piano's detail extended around all four sides of the rosewood case and down its massive legs, while the keys were surfaced with expensive mother-of-pearl. The piano was used by Key until his death in 1843 and currently resides at the Peabody Hotel in Memphis, TN.


And where is that band who so vauntingly swore,

Conductor's Commitment to Knabe

Hans von Bülow is generally regarded as one of the most famous conductors and preeminent executive musicians of his time. Bülow, chief conductor of the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra, arrived in America in 1889 and immediately committed to exclusively using Knabe grand pianos for all of his recitals in the United States.

Bülow conducted his first orchestral concert in the U.S. at the Metropolitan Opera House in front of over 2,000 guests, including many of New York's musical Theatre, followed by repeat performances in Boston Metropolitan Opera House to conduct his "farewell" program.

Bülow was the first to perform the complete cycle of Beethoven's piano sonatas, recognized by many as the most important collections of works in the history of music. Franz greatest pianist of all time, anointed Bülow as his "successor"





An exquisite Wm. Knabe & Co. piano, housed at the historic Ellis Auditorium in Memphis, TN for over 25 years, was purchased by Elvis Presley® in 1957. Manufactured in 1912, amazingly it is the very same piano played at revivals that Elvis attended during his youth. The "King of Rock and Roll" had this prized possession refurbished in white with gold trim, personally supervising the refinishing process. The Knabe piano and matching bench were moved into his music room at the newly built mansion. Several photographs of Elvis standing beside this piano were taken inside Graceland. This Knabe piano was featured in his music room from 1957 to 1969.


When William Knabe built his first piano in 1837, he achieved what others had sought to do but never accomplished, setting a new standard for piano craftsmanship. The Knabe piano had a sweetness and clarity of tone that no other instrument could produce. This quality has characterized every Knabe piano ever built and continues today, and it's a philosophy that distinguishes Knabe.

Knabe pianos are handmade, limited production pianos created in the finest tradition of over 300 years of piano crafting. Production pianos have their place in the world of music. They are tonally consistent and durable, but they lack the "soul" of a handcrafted instrument. Each handmade Knabe has its own personality. When you play a Knabe, you will sense the difference.

Original Knabe concepts such as the solid spruce soundboard shape and dimension, bridge placement, and overall structural design add to capturing the critical essence of the Knabe piano along with the original Baltimore scale on many Knabe models. Only woods, metals, glues or natural fabrics best for each particular purpose are ever permitted in a Knabe. The only wood used for Knabe pin planks is winter-cut, quarter-sawn, northern hard rock maple for added strength and holding power. For other woods, we search the globe, 17 areas in all, for the rarest varieties to provide the specific grain and texture required for each application.




